# MANDELA DAY 2019

Nelson Mandela International Day is an annual event in honour of Nelson Mandela, It is celebrated on 18th July, Mandela's birthday, each year.

Several local businesses and community groups visited us this year and blessed us in umpteen ways. We were also the beneficiaries of the national Food-forward/ Pick'nPay partnership that hosted a Mandela Day food drive. Over four days, Volunteers from Morning Star (staff and teens) were invited to engage with shoppers and encourage them to purchase basic food ingredients for us. 7 trolleys of groceries were donated all-in-all.



# **Our Children's Health**

Sadly, 3 of our children have been very unwell over the past while. 13 year old Rethabile Nthapo has been in and out of hospital for months and just doesn't seem to regain her strength before having a further relapse. She's slowly recovering after a recent chest infection at the moment and will attend Morning Star each day upon her discharge from hospital and until such time that she's well enough to return to school. 12-year-olds Tshepo Kalake and Difedile Moketsane both have CD4 counts of below 10 at present. They were both in Bongani Hospital for a spell and their conditions are still being carefully monitored,

Little Mohau Molefi is a bit better right now but, with an untreatable heart condition, as well as the symptoms associated with HIV/ AIDS, is ever vulnerable and in danger of contracting a new

infection.

Sihle Mdangi's dermatitis has flared up again. He was so much better when he and his y o u n g e r b r o t h e r , Thandokhule, were placed at RHI Children's Village in a Place of safety for four months. Back in his mother's care, Sihle's condition always deteriorates and we go back to square one.

## **OUR PREMISES**





Whilst our premises at both our Welkom and Kutlwanong Centres are in fairly good repair, the infrastructure in the Free State and in Matjhabeng (Welkom and surroundings, in particular) is another matter altogether. No longer is lack of service delivery affecting 'other people' and 'other areas' - it's now right on our doorstep.

The garbage container (called a 'skip' here) at our Welkom

premises at Kopano Complex in Welkom used to be emptied twice weekly. Now it's only emptied twice a month.

The manhole outside our Kowie Street property has been pouring sewerage since last week and has only just been attended to today - almost a week later. The stench is unbelievable! The entire block has been similarly affected for months now. The municipality doesn't have the funds to install new pipes and appears not to know what is actually causing the continual blocking either.

Electric copper cables are repeatedly stolen from the substations in and around Welkom. Each suburb is regularly without power for up to 12 hours or more and until the municipality repairs and replaces the cables. No sooner is one area restored than another is targeted. Cables are stolen and sold to scrap dealers for money or used for illegal connections. Copper cables hold high monetary value and can be sold for about R70.00 per kilogram. (3-4pds). The scrap metal business has become very lucrative with unscrupulous dealers simply buying copper with no questions asked.

A new gas stove (cooker) has recently been installed at our Kutlwanong premises. Using gas in Kutlwanong is vital as the price of electricity is exorbitant.

A big, big thank you to Crowlees Primary School in Mirfield England, for their "Great British Bake-Off Competition" in May and for raising the funds needed to purchase the new cooker.

## AGM AND BOARD MEETING

Our Annual General Meeting took place on Friday 19th July this year. It was very well attended, with a good number of our children's mothers/ guardians present as well. We're not sure if this was as a result of curry & rice for supper being advertised or because board member, Johan Pauw, was our guest speak and spoke on "The role of Non-Governmental Organizations in the context of a d e v e l o p i n g c o u n t r y". Our Board Meeting this quarter was held on Thursday 18th July. Items on the agenda included our way forward regarding the new National Minimal Wage directive, the need of a fulltime youth worker at Morning Star, always strategic planning issues, our financial situation—in that our income is not matching our expenditure each month and our urgent need, as a result, of setting up a Morning Star Charity in in the UK. It was agreed that our chairman, Joshua Bolaji, travel to England at the beginning of October this year to meet with all those willing to both advise us and act as Trustees of our Morning Star Charity. We have had a good response in our appeal in this regard.



## STAFF MEMBERS

Quite a number of our staff have been struggling with coughs and flu over the last few months. This is normally the case during winter and often means that we don't have enough personnel to cover all the areas at Morning Star each day.

Thankfully, our Social Auxiliary Worker, Shiwe Nkuna, returned to work on 22nd July. She had a knee replacement operation at the beginning of June and I'm pleased to report, it was a great success.

Child Care Worker, Lorato

Rapuleng, has had two spells in hospital over the past few months as well. Her one leg swelled significantly in May and she was found to have a DVT (deep vein thrombosis).

Then, last weekend, she began experiencing chest pains and was readmitted to Bongani Hospital and diagnosed with a 'swollen heart'. Her DVT was still at the core of her diagnosis and hadn't been properly treated the first time.

Part-time cleaner, Evelyn Monyatsi, has also been unwell and unable to come to work for 3 weeks. Her epilepsy often spirals out-of-control and this has been the case again. She is going to have to step down from her job at Morning Star, sadly. She's a fantastic cleaner and we're going to miss her very much.

# NEWS OF OUR FAMILIES

We were deeply moved recently upon hearing that 13-year-old Mpho Moahlodi's fellow pupils at her former school in Kutlwanong Township all contributed R5.00 (about 30p) towards the school and hostel fees of her new school, Bartimea School for the Deaf and Blind, in Bloemfontein. These are impoverished families reaching out to one of their own and their compassion touched our hearts. Sadly, Mpho is slowly loosing her sight and needs to be at a school where she can learn in braille and develop the skills she'll need in adulthood. She began at Bartimea School on 12th August.

We are assisting several families at the moment who were born in South Africa but, for one reason or another, have never managed to get Birth Certificates or Identity Documents for themselves. The Chavulas from Kutlwanong are one such family and, after endeavoring since 2015 to assist them with their vital documents, they were finally called to collect them from Home Affairs. There was much excitement when they came into Morning Star with the evidence. It felt like an occasion to celebrate with cake and vuvuzelas. Mum Chavula is now able to apply for her children's birth certificates and access their government child support grants. Praise God!

A few months ago we were approached by a Rotary Club in Johannesburg and asked if we'd like a donation of Lego for our children. Not for it all to be kept and



utilized at Morning Star but to be given to our children to take home and enjoy. Of course, we jumped at the offer and, as promised, almost 100 kits arrived in Welkom in due course. We were determined to not just send the Lego home with the children to be misused, trampled upon and lost. Most of our children have never possessed Lego in their lives before. We decided to conduct workshops at Morning Star first and, once each child had mastered the instructions and could help themselves, we sent the kits home to be completed at leisure. A big thank you to staff members' teenagers who gave up two Saturdays in a row to assist our teenagers construct their intricate Star Wars Lego kits.
